Romagpit stared at the boats, dreaming of sailing across the big blue ocean.





Romagpit walked carefully through a trail hidden by screwpine, thinking of the path in his dream. He walked for a long time until he came to a rough stretch of jagged reef.

Romagpit rowed and rowed, growing stronger with every paddle.


The little whale shark also grew stronger, learning about tides and ocean temperatures.


## The Starry Giant by the Sea – Whale Shark

**Other Names:** Tofu Shark, Gentle Giant Shark

**English Name:** Whale Shark

**Scientific Name:** *Rhincodon typus*

A true shark, not a whale. Though it is a shark, the whale shark has no aggressive tendencies, earning its reputation as a gentle starry giant of the sea.

# Starry Giant – Secret File

## Starry Spots

Their body color ranges from gray-brown to blue-brown or dark brown, with numerous light gray or white checkerboard spots that resemble a beautiful starry sky underwater.

## Starry Giant – Diet Notes

Although whale sharks have large mouths and numerous coarse teeth, they are filter feeders. They gulp large amounts of seawater, filter plankton and other small organisms, and expel excess water through their gills.



## Dorsal Ridges

Three long, prominent ridges run along each side of the back, reducing water resistance.

## Wide, Flat Head

Unlike typical sharks with cylindrical bodies, whale sharks have a broad and flattened head.

## Gill Slits

Like other sharks, whale sharks have five pairs of gill slits, allowing them to filter seawater efficiently.


## Companion Fish

When cruising, whale sharks are often accompanied by large pelagic fish such as mackerel and tuna. In some places, fishermen also take the presence of whale sharks as a sign that fish schools may be nearby.




### “Sticky Buddy” – Remora Fish

Remora fish attach themselves to whale sharks using suction pads on their heads. They hitch a ride, feeding on leftovers and cleaning parasites off the whale shark, making them the shark’s loyal little buddies.



Remora Fish



# Travel Route

Massive whale sharks swim slowly and gracefully. Their migratory routes extend from 30°N to 35°S, covering tropical and subtropical regions of the Atlantic, Indian, and Pacific Oceans. They are visible near coasts, in offshore waters, and in open oceans. Whale sharks often stay near the ocean surface but can dive as deep as 1,982 meters to feed or rest.


## Reproduction of the Starry Giant



Whale sharks are aplacental viviparous (formerly called ovoviparous). A female whale shark can carry up to 300 embryos at once, which is currently the highest number of embryos carried by any known shark. The babies hatch inside the mother's uterus before being born. Taiwan is the only country with documented cases of pregnant whale sharks.



Newborn whale sharks are 46 to 64 cm long. Growth is slow; reaching adult size (8 to 9 meters) takes roughly 30 years.

## Protecting the Starry Giant

Sometimes, whale sharks get lost, become stranded, or accidentally enter set nets. If you encounter a stranded whale shark, please do not touch it.


Instead, call your local **1999 hotline** or the **Coast Guard Administration at 118** to alert trained professionals.

In places such as Taitung and Hualien, set net owners have helped release endangered whale sharks back into the wild after receiving a report.




